Message from the President


Southeastern continues to exceed expectations. Now as the third-largest university in the state, we have successfully maintained our student-friendly appeal and smaller class sizes.

With an eye toward developing an early interest in successful scholarship, the Center for Student Excellence (CSE) developed Southeastern 101, a required freshmen success course designed to give new students a head start in academic excellence.

Southeastern 101 provides tools that address the rigors of academic life on the university level. Topics include the purpose and value of higher education; the expectations and responsibilities of a college student; the development of college-level learning strategies including study skills, critical analysis, and test preparation; choosing the appropriate major and developing degree/career goals; and self-management during the college years.

Introducing the keys to successful scholarship early in the students' careers helps ensure the skills and knowledge gained in Southeastern 101 can be applied throughout their college careers.



Points of Excellence 2006 - 2007



- » For the second consecutive year, the **Southeastern Channel** won an Emmy for a promotional spot for its award winning program about the history of the Florida parishes, *The Florida Parish Chronicles*.
- » For the fifth consecutive year, Southeastern's yearbook, *Le Souvenir*, was recognized with a first-place award from the American Scholastic Press Association in New York.
- » Southeastern Laboratory School art teacher, **Ms. Denise Tullier-Holly**, was named the 2007 National Elementary Art Educator of the Year by the National Art Education Association.
- » Theater instructor **James Winter's** original full-length play, *Dead Flowers*, was selected to be turned into a film by the independent film company, Ghost Rider Pictures.
- » Management professor Dr. David Wyld received the national "Rising Star Award," presented by e-Gov Institute and Federal Computer Week, as an up and coming leader in the government information technology community. The award recognized his work in RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology.
- » Southeastern wetlands expert **Dr. Paul Keddy** was selected from researchers across the country to receive the 2007 National Wetlands Award for Science Research co-presented by the Environmental Law Institute. The prize was awarded at a national ceremony at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's headquarters in Washington, D.C.
- » The Manchac Swamp: Man-made Disaster in Search of Resolution, a film produced by Southeastern's Center for Southeast Louisiana Studies, was selected to appear in the New York International Film Festival. The film details the historical degradation of the Manchac Swamp ecosystem.
- » Southeastern's student newspaper, **the Lion's Roar**, received four awards at the annual Louisiana Press Association 2006 meeting. The paper received a first place award in the "Advertising Idea or Promotion" category, a second place in the advertising "Black and White Over ½ Page" category, a third place in the "Best General News Photo or Feature Photo" category, and an honorable mention in the "General Excellence" category.

- » **The Southeastern Chapter of Gamma Beta Phi** hosted the 2006 Louisiana State Conference on campus. Southeastern was also the only chapter in the state to receive the Distinguished Chapter Award, which is the highest award given by the national organization to a local chapter.
- » **Southeastern's Epsilon Phi Chapter of Delta Tau Delta International Fraternity** earned top honors at the Southern Division Leadership Conference held in Atlanta. Epsilon Phi was one of two chapters in the Southern Division to receive the Chapter of Excellence award for their outstanding commitment to excellence in both internal and external operations of the chapter.
- Southeastern and the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce (USHCC) Foundation signed an agreement designed to foster the development of programs and initiatives to aid the region's growing Hispanic business community. It is the first such agreement between a Louisiana university and the USHCC. A key focus of the program is the creation of the Latino Virtual National Business and Training Institute. The institute will develop electronic learning tools and other business-related training resources that will be offered to chambers of commerce and other organizations throughout the nation.
- » Southeastern Biologist **Dr. Brian Crother** was elected president-elect of the Society for the Study of Amphibians and Reptiles, an international scientific society.
- » Two Southeastern professors, Dr. Frederick Dembowski in the College of Education and Human Development, and Dr. Robert Kramer in the College of Nursing and Health Sciences, were appointed to editorial positions with national publications. Dembowski is serving as managing editor of NCPEA Connexions and Kramer was appointed associate editor of the journal Metabolism.
- » Dr. Aristides R. Baraya, director of the College of Business Latin American Business Initiative, was nominated to participate in the National Hispanic Leadership Summit for the second consecutive year. He was one of only 350 individuals in the nation nominated by U.S. senators to participate in the conference.
- » Mathematics professor Dr. Zach Teitler was selected as a participant in the prestigious national program, Project NExT (New Experiences in Teaching), which drew new or recent doctoral degree recipients interested in improving the teaching and learning methods of undergraduate mathematics students.

A Brief History of Southeastern Louisiana University



Southeastern Louisiana University began as a grass roots movement by the people of Hammond and the surrounding area who recognized the need for an institution of higher education in order to further the educational, economic, and cultural development of southeast Louisiana. What began as a junior college supported by local taxes has developed into a major university as Southeastern has grown to meet the evolving needs of southeast Louisiana and the Florida parishes.

On July 7, 1925, the voters overwhelmingly approved a bond issue that created Hammond Junior College. Operated under the auspices of the Tangipahoa Parish School Board, President Linus A. Sims opened the doors on September 14, 1925 with a faculty of three women, two men, and forty students. The two-year coeducational institution offered basic undergraduate work in arts and sciences that culminated in a teaching certificate.

Rapidly increasing enrollments quickly forced the college out of its two rooms in Hammond High School. In 1927, voters supported the purchase of the Hunter Leake estate on Hammond's north end. In 1928 Hammond Junior College became Southeastern Louisiana College, formally adopted into the state educational system under the control of the State Board of Education. In 1937, the State Board of Education authorized curricula for four-year programs in liberal arts, teacher education, business administration, music, social sciences, and physical education. The first baccalaureate degrees were conferred in May 1939.

Voter approval of Act No. 388 in 1938, an amendment to the 1920 Louisiana Constitution, granted Southeastern Louisiana College the same legal status as other four-year colleges. The amendment did not, however, require the state to fund Southeastern at the level of other institutions of higher education, despite strong local support.

On March 3, 1946, Southeastern was formally approved and accepted into full membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), as a four-year degree-granting institution.

In 1960, the State Board authorized Southeastern to offer master's degrees through the newly-formed Division of Graduate Studies. Southeastern began awarding the Education Specialist degree in 1967.

Governor John J. McKeithen on June 16, 1970 signed into law the legislative act turning Southeastern Louisiana College into Southeastern Louisiana University.



A Brief History of Southeastern Louisiana University (continued)

In October of 1986, a group of faculty members launched Fanfare, a festival celebrating the arts, humanities, and sciences. Since then, Fanfare has become an acclaimed month-long event, drawing nationally and internationally recognized artists and providing recognition for those closer to home. In addition to providing entertainment for the North Shore, Fanfare has an educational outreach program that works closely with local schools. In October 2005, Fanfare proudly celebrated its 20th Anniversary.

Southeastern's enrollment, continually increasing since its inception, reached an important milestone in 1997, registering over fifteen thousand students for the Fall semester. Since 1925 Southeastern has conferred over fifty thousand degrees.

As Southeastern celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2000, the Fall semester marked an exciting change as Southeastern implemented screened admissions standards for the first time. Theses standards were strengthened in 2003 and again in 2005.

In May 2001, Southeastern received full approval from the Board of Regents for its first new graduate degree program in more than a decade, a MS in Integrated Science and Technology. Since then, Southeastern has received approval for seven additional programs: MA in Organizational Communications, MS in Applied Sociology, BS in Athletic Training, BS in Health Education & Promotion, BS in Health Studies, BS in Occupational Health, Safety, & Environment, and Master of Arts in Teaching.

In Fall 2005, Southeastern implemented the Board of Regents Master Plan admissions criterion and then six days into the semester, Hurricane Katrina hit southeast Louisiana. While Southeastern suffered no major structural damages, many students, faculty, and staff were impacted. Also, Southeastern was able to play an instrumental role in the relief effort by providing housing for the National Guard, disaster relief teams from across the country, and utility workers.

In Fall 2006, Southeastern enrolled its very first doctoral students. Ten students began in the Ed.D. in Educational Leadership that Southeastern offers in conjunction with the University of Louisiana – Lafayette. That fall also marked the opening of the Center for Student Excellence, a center to help provide students the resources they need to get the most from their education and graduate in a timely manner. The center was the result of many years of work by a large segment of the Southeastern community.

Southeastern continues to demonstrate its commitment to student success through its new "Progression Scholarships" program. These unique scholarships were created to encourage new students to continue to make steady progress toward completing their degrees on time. The beginning freshmen from the Summer and Fall 2007 semesters will be the first cohort eligible to receive this award. "Our degrees are four year programs," said President Randy



Moffett. "We are encouraging students to place a priority on enrolling in the right classes, successfully completing those classes, and moving toward their degree in the four-year time frame."


Beginning in the Fall of 2008, the Progression Scholarships will automatically provide qualified students with a percentage of their tuition and fees if they complete 25% of their degree in the first year, 50% in the second year, and 75% in the third year. Students who meet their academic timelines could receive as much as \$2,880 of financial assistance by the time they graduate.

"As far as we know, Southeastern is the only university in Louisiana offering such a scholarship initiative," said Moffett. "We are committed to helping our students succeed."




Number of Students Enrolled Fall 2007





Longitudinal Enrollment Fall 1997 - Fall 2007





Number of Students by Ethnicity and Gender Fall 2007



Diversity Over Time at Southeastern Fall 2003 - Fall 2007






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Graduation Rate 2000 Freshmen Cohort






Years to Graduate

Passage Rates, PRAXIS 2005 - 2006






Student Satisfaction

- » 88% of students would attend Southeastern again if they started over.
- » 94% of Southeastern students rate their educational experiences as good or excellent.
- » 87% of Southeastern students say that other students are friendly and supportive, 82% think faculty are available and helpful, and 61% think administrators are helpful and considerate.

Institutional Commitment for Student Learning and Success

- » 76% of students think Southeastern provides "quite a bit" of support for student success.
- » 80% rate the quality of academic advising at Southeastern as good or excellent.
- » 87% think Southeastern contributed "quite a bit" to their acquiring a broad general education and 76% think Southeastern contributed "quite a bit" to their acquiring job-related skills.

Student Interaction with Campus Faculty

- » 61% of Southeastern students often discuss readings or ideas with faculty outside of class.
- 42% of students often talk about career plans with a faculty member.
- » 63% often work harder than they thought they could to meet faculty's expectations.

Active Learning Experiences

- » 64% of Southeastern students plan on participating in or have participated in community service or volunteer work.
- 72% of Southeastern students plan on participating in or have participated in some type of hands-on experience (internship, practicum, clinical assignment, etc.).
- » 68% of Southeastern students often participate in class discussions.



ACT Student Opinion Survey Results Spring 2007



- » Students' level of satisfaction with "This college in general" of 4.06 is above 2005's level of satisfaction 4.01, as well as above the national 3.93 and system average 3.88.
- » Library facilities and services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.31, compared to 4.11 nationally and 4.20 at the system level. Furthermore, 86% of students reported using the library.
- » Class size relative to the type of course had an average level of satisfaction of 4.25, compared to 4.06 nationally and 4.02 at the system level.
- » Recreational and intramural programs and services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.24, compared to 4.09 nationally and 4.12 at the system level.
- » Veterans services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.14, compared to 3.98 nationally and 3.93 at the system level.
- » Computer services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.13, compared to 4.01 nationally and 4.08 at the system level.
- » Student health services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.10, compared to 3.77 nationally and 3.86 at the system level.
- » Attitude of the faculty towards students had an average level of satisfaction of 4.07, compared to 3.96 nationally and 3.88 at the system level.
- » Laboratory facilities had an average level of satisfaction of 3.77, compared to 3.66 nationally and 3.50 at the system level.

Southeastern Employer Survey Results



- » Over 75% of employers think Southeastern graduates were better prepared for employment when compared to other employees.
- » All of the employers would hire another Southeastern graduate.
- » Dependability was the skill that Southeastern graduates were rated highest in (4.66 on a 1-5 scale from Poor to Excellent).
- » Working in an Ethical Manner was the second highest rated skill (4.64) and was also the skill rated most important by employers (4.96).
- » Critical Thinking Skills were also rated important to graduates jobs (4.74) and over 50% of the respondents were rated Excellent on those skills (average = 4.37).
- » Employers indicated work attitude is the most important thing they look for when hiring a new employee.

- » 86% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the overall quality of their department.
- » 86% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the overall quality of their degree program.






Student Success After Graduation





Southeastern Market Share







Other Demographic Characteristics of Southeastern Students



In the Fall of 2007, Institutional Research and Assessment conducted a survey of Southeastern's student body. The random sample survey provided the following background information on Southeastern's students.

- » Most (70%) of the respondents have never been married, and 28% are currently married.
- » About one-fourth (22%) of the respondents have children under the age of 18.
- » More than one-third (37%) of the respondents travel more than 30 miles, one way, to Southeastern's main campus, 39% travel between 5 and 30 miles, 13% travel less than 5 miles and 11% live on campus.
- » The vast majority (81%) of the respondents work, with most of them (61%) working off campus. Sixteen percent (16%) work on campus and 4% work both on and off campus.
- » Of the students who work, 41% work 20 or fewer hours per week, 23% work 21 to 30 hours per week, and 37% work more than 30 hours per week.
- » Approximately one-fourth (22%) of the respondents are first-generation college students, meaning, neither of their parents have any college education. Over one-third (35%) of the students have a parent who has earned a baccalaureate degree or higher.







Faculty Scholarship: Technology Educator of the Year



The Louisiana Technology Council named John Fulwiler, Southeastern professor of educational leadership and technology, Technology Educator of the Year. Fulwiler was recognized for his work as chair of the fourth annual Northshore Excellence in Teaching with Technology (NETT). These annual awards celebrate and recognize innovation and achievement for those who have made a positive impact in technology in our area.

Fulwiler has been a prominent leader in ensuring technology training for the region's educators. He played a key role in the successful collaboration between Southeastern, Delgado, and the Tangipahoa, St. Tammany, Washington, Livingston, and St. Helena Parish School Boards, which now provide opportunities for educators of those organizations to receive hands-on training and suggestions for integrating technology in the classroom.

Fulwiler said that since Hurricane Katrina, the 84-mile I-12 corridor between Baton Rouge and Slidell has become a "linear center" of economic activity. "One common unifying factor that is critical to support the growth and change is technology," he said. "It is an opportune time for the professional education community to partner with those in the economic community to better serve the growing needs of the region."





During the 2007-2008 budget appropriation for Louisiana's public postsecondary institutions, Governor Kathleen Babineaux Blanco and the Louisiana Legislature did something unprecedented in Southeastern's history: provided the institution with 100% Formula Funding. According to President Randy Moffett, "this sends a bold, clear message that education is a priority in Louisiana." **Traditionally** under funded compared to its peer institutions, Southeastern received an additional \$22.4 million in its annual budget, allowing the University to add much needed faculty and staff, improve technology, and develop new programs aimed at helping disadvantaged students complete their college education.

stated Moffett. "We think this is a great investment and pledge to use these resources wisely. The additional funding will enable us to improve educational access for students, add needed services directed toward student success, strengthen our outreach and collaboration with public schools, and expand our efforts in the area of economic development and job creation."


Athletics at Southeastern Louisiana University Notable Highlights 2006 - 2007

Continuing Education 2006 - 2007



The Division of Continuing Education and Special Activities' main functions are the coordination of all non-credit and special activities, both on and off-campus, and the coordination of off-campus credit courses and telecourses. Continuing Education strives to meet the needs of the non-traditional student as well as the needs of business, industry, government, and the public sector. The division offers a variety of camps during the summer, and is also responsible for reserving Southeastern's facilities for off-campus groups.

Accomplishments of Continuing Education during the 2006-2007 academic year include:

- » 6,621 enrolled in academic courses at eight off-campus sites
- » 14,673 enrolled in electronically delivered courses 669 classes
- » 418 students enrolled in non-credit courses resulting in 242.6 CEU's awarded
- » 4,264 students participated in Summer Camp Programs
- » 29 off-campus groups reserved Southeastern's facilities, attracting over 15,000 visitors to the campus
- » 351 workers attended the Incumbent Worker Training Program courses taught by Southeastern instructors
- » 2,468 workers attended the Incumbent Worker Training Program courses taught by outside vendors
- » 179,832 individuals attended events at the University Center (not including students attending classes)

Linus A. Sims Memorial Library: Sims Library utilizes a variety of technologies, including a 24/7 virtual reference service, to deliver resources and services to the students and faculty of Southeastern. The Library's online catalog, electronic indexes, full-text databases, and an electronic reserves system are made available on 120 computers throughout the building. Internet access, printing, and wireless technology are also offered. Many of the Library's operations are handled through the statewide automated library system, Sirsi UnicornLink, operated by the LOUIS office at Louisiana State University. Interlibrary Loan transactions are facilitated through use of ILLiad, an electronic Interlibrary Loan system, and through use of Ariel software designed to facilitate timely delivery of articles. The Library also subsidizes article delivery services for faculty and graduate students through Ingenta, a database which offers citations from 20,000 multi-disciplinary scholarly journals, in addition to electronic alerting and table of contents services. Within the Library, a computer lab, partially funded by the Student Technology Fee, provides access to a variety of application software packages. A computer with adaptive equipment and software, (including JAWS, Naturally Speaking, ZoomText, and OpenBook), is available in the Media Department. Two laboratory classrooms allow hands-on learning for students enrolled in the Library's credit course teaching information literacy skills and for course-specific bibliographic instruction classes. An additional classroom for non-credit instructional sessions utilizes a wireless laptop system to allow hands-on experience. The Library's webpage provides links to the myriad of resources and services, with online forms available for a variety of service requests.

<u>Center for Faculty Excellence</u>: The Center for Faculty Excellence helps faculty assess and incorporate technology in their teaching through workshops, seminars, and individualized training. The Center offers software support ranging from basic office applications to graphics and video editing programs, as well as a variety of equipment including scanners, color printers, and digital cameras. The knowledge and skills faculty gain through the Center are transformed into tools and strategies that enhance both traditional and distance learning environments.



Space Utilization 2006 - 2007







State Appropriations per Full-Time Equivalent Student, SREB States, Fiscal Year 2005 - 2006








University Expenditures (Budgeted) by Function Fiscal Year 2007 - 2008
