Message from the Interim President



Growing with Integrity: "Combating Nursing Shortages"

According to leading nursing work force analysts from Vanderbilt University, there could be as many as 500,000 vacant nursing positions nationwide by 2025. This severe shortage could incapacitate the health care system, leaving many patients without access to proper medical care.

Additional state funding allows Southeastern to enroll more nursing students to address the shortage. Southeastern, the fifth largest nursing producer in the United States, is working with state nursing and education leaders to recruit more students into the profession, give them a high quality education that is grounded in the realities of the workplace, graduate more nurses quickly, and help keep them on the job.

In addition, Southeastern is now participating in a state-sponsored program designed to help registered nurses holding a diploma or associate degree earn their bachelor's degree, an important step in career advancement. Through the state's Center for Adult Learning in Louisiana, Southeastern is offering the degree program through a fast track, completely online initiative.

According to Southeastern School of Nursing Director Barbara Moffett, "We're seeing a great response to our recruitment efforts. I think we're all doing our part to keep the workforce in place."



Points of Excellence 2007 - 2008



- » Southeastern received its first patent for a deformation prediction instrument developed by physicist Sanichiro Yoshida. It has the potential to identify weaknesses in structures ranging from massive bridge construction to the tiniest elements of nanotechnology no larger than a speck of dust on a pinhead.
- » The **Southeastern Channel** won the coveted Emmy Awards for the third straight year. The channel won two Emmys for a five-spot image campaign for Southeastern, "Tomorrow's Leaders."
- » Classical pianist **Kenneth Boulton** was nominated for a Grammy for his album *Louisiana A Pianist's Journey* in the category of best instrumental soloist performer (without orchestra).
- » For the second consecutive year, a Southeastern student, Kinesiology-exercise science major **Craig Alton Thomas**, received a national fellowship for post-graduate study from the National Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi.
- » The Southeastern Channel promotional spots won four national Telly Awards for 2007. The Florida Parish Chronicles promotook a first-place Silver Telly for animation and a second-place Bronze Telly for editing. Native Sounds and Current Events promos both received a Bronze Telly in the animation category.
- » Southeastern became the first public university in the United States to be recognized for its **Latin American programs** by the Ibero-American Council for Excellence in Education, a consortium of 18 ministries of education in Latin America.
- » Student news and sports programs airing on the Southeastern Channel won four first place "Mark of Excellence" awards from the Society of Professional Journalists. The channel's first place winners and categories include John Reis, "Television General News Reporting;" Chris Coleman, "Television Sports Reporting;" Reis, Chris Guagliardo, Nick Brilleaux, and Dustin Thomas, "Television Sports Photography;" and the Southeastern Channel staff, "Television Newscast."
- » Southeastern's **Epsilon Phi Chapter of Delta Tau Delta Fraternity** was honored with the prestigious Court of Honor Award at the Southern Division Leadership Conference.

- » *Creatures of Habit*, a composition by **Brian Hanson** of Covington, a senior in General Studies was performed at the Omaha Symphony New Music Symposium after winning a national competition for young composers.
- » Southeastern became the first university in the South and one of only 16 other institutions to join a Library of Congress initiative designed to encourage the educational use of the library's vast stock of online primary source materials. Southeastern also received a \$300,000, three-year grant from U.S. Senator Mary Landrieu and Librarian of Congress James H. Billington.
- » Southeastern's redesigned **master's degree program in education** was rated with programs at three other Louisiana institutions as among the best in the southern states in preparing future school principals and other education leaders.
- » For the third time in six years, Southeastern's Nursing program received the Nightingale Award as the "Nursing School of the Year" from the Louisiana Nurses Foundation.
- » The staff of the *Lion's Roar*, Southeastern's student newspaper, brought home eight awards from the Louisiana Press Association's annual convention held in Lafayette. The awards included a first place standing in the "Best Column" category.
- » Southeastern graduate **Michelle Berthelot** was crowned Miss Louisiana USA 2008 at the annual pageant held in Lafayette and advanced to the Miss USA pageant.
- » Blair Abene, a senior Music major, won the title of Miss Louisiana 2008 and will represent the state in the Miss America pageant.
- » Southeastern became the only university in Louisiana to offer a unique "**Progression Scholarship**" to encourage students to complete their undergraduate degrees in four years.

A Brief History of Southeastern Louisiana University



Southeastern Louisiana University began as a grass roots movement by the people of Hammond and the surrounding area, who recognized the need for an institution of higher education in order to further the educational, economic, and cultural development of southeast Louisiana. What began as a junior college supported by local taxes has developed into a major university as Southeastern has grown to meet the evolving needs of southeast Louisiana and the Florida parishes.

On July 7, 1925, the voters overwhelmingly approved a bond issue that created Hammond Junior College. Operated under the auspices of the Tangipahoa Parish School Board, President Linus A. Sims opened the doors on September 14, 1925 with a faculty of three women, two men, and forty students. The two-year coeducational institution offered basic undergraduate work in arts and sciences that culminated in a teaching certificate.

Rapidly increasing enrollments quickly forced the college out of its two rooms in Hammond High School. In 1927, voters supported the purchase of the Hunter Leake estate on Hammond's north end. In 1928 Hammond Junior College became Southeastern Louisiana College, formally adopted into the state educational system under the control of the State Board of Education. The purchase of sixty acres adjoining the original fifteen-acre plot provided the space to develop a suitable campus, and in 1934, a state bond issue provided for the

construction of McGehee Hall and a gymnasium.

In 1937, the State Board of Education authorized curricula for four-year programs in liberal arts, teacher education, business administration, music, social sciences, and physical education. The first baccalaureate degrees were conferred in May 1939.

Voter approval of Act No. 388 in 1938, an amendment to the 1920 Louisiana Constitution, granted Southeastern Louisiana College the same legal status as other four-year colleges. The amendment did not, however, require the state to fund Southeastern at the level of other institutions of higher education, despite strong local support.

On March 3, 1946, Southeastern was formally approved and accepted into full membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) as a four-year degree-granting institution.

In 1960, the State Board authorized Southeastern to offer master's degrees through the newly-formed Division of Graduate Studies. Southeastern began awarding the Education Specialist degree in 1967.

Governor John J. McKeithen on June 16, 1970 signed into law the legislative act turning Southeastern Louisiana College into Southeastern Louisiana University.

A Brief History of Southeastern Louisiana University (continued)



In October of 1986, a group of faculty members launched Fanfare, a festival celebrating the arts, humanities, and sciences. Since then, Fanfare has become an acclaimed month long event, drawing nationally and internationally recognized artists and providing recognition for those closer to home. In addition to providing entertainment for the North Shore, Fanfare has an educational outreach program that works closely with local schools. In October 2005, Fanfare proudly celebrated its 20th Anniversary.

Southeastern's enrollment, continually increasing since its inception, reached an important milestone in 1997, registering over fifteen thousand students for the fall semester. Since 1925 Southeastern has conferred over fifty thousand degrees.

As Southeastern celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2000, the Fall semester marked an exciting change as Southeastern implemented screened admissions standards for the first time. These standards were strengthened in 2003 and again in 2005.

Fall 2003 saw the return of football to Strawberry Stadium. The Lions completed the season 5-7.

In Fall 2005 Southeastern implemented the Board of Regents Master Plan admissions criterion and then six days into the semester, Hurricane Katrina hit southeast Louisiana. While Southeastern suffered no major structural damages, many students, faculty, and staff were impacted. Also, Southeastern was able to play an instrumental

role in the relief effort by providing housing for the National Guard, disaster relief teams from across the country, and utility workers.

In Fall 2006, Southeastern enrolled its very first doctoral students. Ten students began in the Ed.D. in Educational Leadership that Southeastern offers in conjunction with the University of Louisiana – Lafayette. That fall also marked the opening of the Center for Student Excellence, a center to help provide students the resources they need to get the most from their education and graduate in a timely manner. The center was the result of many years of work by a large segment of the Southeastern community.

In Fall 2008, Southeastern received word that the Art program had been accredited by the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD). This achievement means that every degree program at Southeastern required or recommended by the State Board of Regents to achieve national discipline-specific accreditation has been reached.

Since 1925, many dedicated individuals have lead Southeastern from a junior college to the vibrant university it is today. Those individuals who have served as a Southeastern President are: Linus A. Sims, Yves Leon Fontenot, J. Leon Clark, George W. Bond, Gladney Jack Tinsley, Luther Dyson, Clark LeBlanc Barrow, J.B. Wooley, Clea Parker, J. Larry Crain, G. Warren Smith, Sally Clausen, Randy Moffett, and John Crain.

student-athletes."


The Lady Lions hit the court sporting special pink uniforms for their Southland Conference contest with Lamar. At halftime, the team paid tribute to five honorary coaches, all breast cancer survivors, two from the Southeastern family and three from the larger community.

The event was especially poignant for the Lady Lions since their most famous alumnus, Robin Roberts, news anchor for ABC's Good Morning America (Class of '83), is currently battling breast cancer. Although she could not be there, she was represented by one of her team members, who carried a jersey with Robin's old Southeastern number, 21.

The Women's Basketball Coaches Association's "Think Pink" initiative is a global, unified effort for the WBCA's nation of coaches to assist in raising breast cancer awareness on the court, across campuses, in communities, and beyond.


Number of Students Enrolled Fall 2008





Longitudinal Enrollment Fall 1998 - Fall 2008







Number of Students by Ethnicity and Gender Fall 2008




Diversity Over Time at Southeastern Fall 2004 - Fall 2008





Graduation Rate 2001 Freshmen Cohort






Passage Rates, State Board of Nursing Examination 2006 and 2007

Student Satisfaction

- » 86% of students would attend Southeastern again if they started over.
- » 89% of Southeastern students rate their educational experiences as good or excellent.
- » 81% of Southeastern students say that other students are friendly and supportive, 78% think faculty are available and helpful, and 57% think administrators are helpful and considerate.

Institutional Commitment for Student Learning and Success

- » 79% of students think Southeastern provides "quite a bit" of support for student success.
- » 77% rate the quality of academic advising at Southeastern as good or excellent.
- » 88% think Southeastern contributed "quite a bit" to their acquiring a broad general education and 73% think Southeastern contributed "quite a bit" to their acquiring job-related skills.

Student Interaction with Campus Faculty

- » 62% of Southeastern students often discuss grades or assignments with an instructor.
- 47% of students often talk about career plans with a faculty member.
- » 63% often work harder than they thought they could to meet faculty's expectations.

Active Learning Experiences

- » 65% of Southeastern students plan on participating in or have participated in community service or volunteer work.
- 74% of Southeastern students plan on participating in or have participated in some type of hands-on experience (internship, practicum, clinical assignment, etc.).
- » 62% of Southeastern students often participate in class discussions.

ACT Student Opinion Survey Results Spring 2008



- » Students' level of satisfaction with "This college in general" of 4.05 is above the national average of 3.92 and system average of 3.90.
- » Library facilities and services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.25, compared to 4.13 nationally and 4.17 at the system level. Furthermore, 84% of students reported using the library.
- » Class size relative to the type of course had an average level of satisfaction of 4.27, compared to 4.07 nationally and 4.05 at the system level.
- » Recreational and intramural programs and services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.13, compared to 4.11 nationally and 4.09 at the system level.
- » Veterans services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.08, compared to 3.94 nationally and 3.91 at the system level.
- » Computer services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.05, compared to 4.02 nationally and 4.04 at the system level.
- » Student health services had an average level of satisfaction of 4.02, compared to 3.77 nationally and 3.82 at the system level.
- » Attitude of the faculty towards students had an average level of satisfaction of 4.03, compared to 3.95 nationally and 3.88 at the system level.
- » Laboratory facilities had an average level of satisfaction of 3.78, compared to 3.64 nationally and 3.54 at the system level.

Southeastern Employer Survey Results



- » Over 75% of employers think Southeastern graduates were better prepared for employment when compared to other employees.
- » All of the employers would hire another Southeastern graduate.
- » Basic Computer Skills was the skill in which Southeastern graduates were rated highest (4.73 on a 1-5 scale from Poor to Excellent).
- » Working in an Ethical Manner and Reading Skills were the second highest rated skill (4.66), Working in an Ethical Manner was also one of the skills rated most important by employers (4.94).
- Dependability was rated most important to graduates jobs (4.76) and 70% of the respondents were rated Excellent on Dependability (average = 4.63).
- » Employers indicated work attitude is the most important thing they look for when hiring a new employee.

Southeastern Exit Survey Results 2007-2008

The Southeastern Exit Survey is completed by all students, at all degree levels, the semester they graduate.

Faculty

- » 89% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with faculty treatment of students both inside and outside of the classroom.
- » 86% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the effectiveness of the faculty as teachers.
- » 83% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the interest shown by faculty in their academic development.
- » 83% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the opportunities to interact with faculty outside of class.

Courses

- » 91% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the size of classes in their majors.
- » 88% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the quality of instruction regarding standards and ethics in



their major.

- 88% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the quality of instruction in advanced courses.
- » 81% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the relevancy of courses.

Resources and Facilities

- 79% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the library resources related to their major.
- » 77% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the facilities and equipment for courses in their major.

Overall Satisfaction

- » 86% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the overall quality of their department.
- » 85% of graduates are satisfied or very satisfied with the overall quality of their degree program.


Student Success After Graduation



In Spring 2007, Institutional Research and Assessment conducted a survey of alumni who had graduated in academic years 2002-2003, 2003-2004, and 2004-2005. Some highlights of the survey include:

- » The vast majority (95%) are satisfactorily employed.
- » Over three-fourths (80%) are continuing or plan to continue their education.
- » Most (88%) of the respondents employed full-time, work in the state of Louisiana, with the majority being employed in the area of their Southeastern major or a related area.
- » The average income of alumni exceeds the average income of Louisiana residents.

Honors Program 2007 - 2008



- » At the Fall 2007 Honors Program Awards Convocation, twenty-three students received the Sophomore Honors Distinction Award. All of these students had a GPA of 3.5 or higher after completing at least sixty hours, including at least twelve hours in Honors courses. Dr. Martin Kearney of the Department of English received the annual Honors Teaching Award.
- » Honors students participated in the National Collegiate Honors Council annual meeting in Denver, CO. Honors students Lucia Foster, Josh Robin, and Elizabeth Zaben and Honors faculty member Dr. Joan Faust represented Southeastern at this convention.
- Anthony Mele received the Outstanding Honors Student Award from Phi Kappa Phi.
- » Eight senior theses were presented in public forums. The disciplines in which the theses were completed represent the breadth of the Honors Program: Biology, Management, English, History, Mathematics, and Political Science.
- » The Honors Student Team once again defeated all comers to win the Phi Kappa Phi Quiz Bowl during football Homecoming Week.

- » The Honors Club sponsored the Senior Awards Banquet in the Student Union Ballroom. At this banquet, graduating seniors were recognized for their efforts and presented with their Honors cords.
- » The Honors Program co-sponsored an interdisciplinary lecture series on Global Climate Change. The staff members were pleased to bring four speakers on campus representing the scientific, economic, public policy, and personal responsibility facets of this complex issue.

Study Abroad and International Initiatives 2007 - 2008

- Arrangements were made for Southeastern Louisiana University students to attend the University of Verona and the University of Messina in 2008 for intensive Italian study in accordance with our reciprocal agreements with those universities.
- » Study Abroad featured new programs for Southeastern students for 2008, including a Business program in Beijing and Shanghai, China, a Business program in the Republic of Panama, a Spanish Language program at the University of Salamanca in Spain, as well as the first Spring Break Study Abroad program to study Humanities in Berlin, Germany.
- » Study Abroad worked to offer new programs for the summer of 2009, including a Spring Break program to Munich, Germany, a Theatre, Communications, and History program to England, as well as adding a History program to China and a second Tropical Ecology program to Costa Rica, featuring Sea Turtle Biology and Conservation.

» The Student Government Association's (SGA) Study Abroad Scholarship Program offered \$75,600 in awards to 91 students in the summer of 2008.



New Students by Enrollment Type Fall 2008









Southeastern Market Share Fall 2007





Student/Faculty Ratio and Average Class Size by College Fall 2008



Other Demographic Characteristics of Southeastern Students



In the Fall of 2008, Institutional Research and Assessment conducted a survey of Southeastern's student body. The random sample survey provided the following background information on Southeastern's students.

- » Most (75%) of the respondents have never been married, and 20% are currently married.
- » About one-fifth (19%) of the respondents have children under the age of 18.
- » More than one-third (40%) of the respondents travel more than 30 miles, one way, to Southeastern's main campus, 31% travel between 5 and 30 miles, 17% travel less than 5 miles, and 12% live on campus.
- » The vast majority (73%) of the respondents work, with most of them (60%) working off campus. Ten percent (10%) work on campus and 4% work both on and off campus.
- » Of the students who work, 38% work 20 or fewer hours per week, 30% work 21 to 30 hours per week, and 32% work more than 30 hours per week.
- » Approximately one-fourth (26%) of the respondents are first-generation college students, meaning neither of their parents have any college education. Over one-third (35%) of the students have a parent who has earned a baccalaureate degree or higher.





FISHES OF THE LAKE PONTCHARTRAIN BASIN

Teaching with Integrity: "Fishes of the Lake Pontchartrain Basin"



Southeastern Louisiana University biologist Kyle Piller is on a mission to educate school children and others about the region's wide variety of fishes. Through a grant from the Lake Pontchartrain Basin Foundation, he produced a poster picturing 30 of the more than 100 documented species existing in the lakes, rivers, and bayous that make up the basin.

"The majority of the fishes that occur in the basin are not sportfish and are not recreationally harvested," Piller said. "Because of this, most species in the basin are unappreciated and don't receive the 'press' that the sportfish do. But they are important species and play valuable ecological roles."

Unlike previous fish posters that showed freshwater species of Louisiana and the fishes of the Gulf of Mexico, no previous efforts have been dedicated to depicting the variety of fishes indigenous to the region as a whole.

"I wanted to include a mixture of the marine, freshwater, and estuarine species that occur in the lakes, bayous, and rivers like the Tangipahoa, Blind, and Amite that comprise the basin," he said. "I would like to see young children gain an appreciation for nature's diversity and become better aware of all of the organisms that we have in the region."



Faculty and Staff by Parish of Residence Fall 2008







Integrity with Resources:



Southeastern has initiated several new scholarship programs in order to increase the affordability of a higher education. The University began a new financial aid program called Louisiana Go Grants. The Go Grant is the state's new need-based college aid program funded by the state Legislature that was able to provide assistance to many Southeastern students.

The program is designed to bridge the gap between the federal Pell Grant aid program and the actual cost of attending a Louisiana college or university.

Southeastern also initiated its Progression Scholarship Program the first of its kind in the state – designed to reward students who are making satisfactory progress toward their selected degree. Nearly 850 students qualified for the scholarship, which provides qualified freshmen who have completed 25 percent of their degree with a 2.0 or better grade point average a scholarship equal to 10 percent of their tuition and fees for their sophomore year. The scholarship will continue each year if the students maintain their progress.

"It is important that we make higher education more accessible," said Interim President John Crain. "Affordability is a key barrier to many students, and the most efficient way to expand access to postsecondary education is to increase our investments in need-based aid." "A college or university education has never been as important as it is today," he added, "and the economic viability of our state relies on our ability to educate our residents, adequately prepare them for an evolving economy, and retain them for our workforce."

Athletics at Southeastern Louisiana University Notable Highlights 2006 - 2007



- Southeastern pitcher Wade Miley was selected with the 43rd overall pick in the 2008 Major League Baseball Draft by the Arizona Diamondbacks. Miley helped the Lions finish with a 32-27 record and a third place finish in the Southland Conference Tournament.
- » The Southeastern women's tennis team earned their third straight Southland Conference regular season title, finishing with a 22-3 record. Emilija Arnaudovska was named the SLC Player of the Year for the second straight year, while teammate Nina Knavs was named ESPN Magazine Academic All-American and SLC Student-Athlete of the Year.
- » The Southeastern men's basketball team advanced to the Southland Conference Tournament and finished 17-13 to complete its fifth consecutive winning season.
- » Southeastern running back Jay Lucas set the school's single-season record for rushing yards and touchdowns on the way to earning first team All-Southland Conference honors, while kicker Jeff Turner earned All-American and All-SLC recognition. The Lions ended the season on a high note with a 14-10 win over Nicholls State, bringing the River Bell back to Hammond for the first time in more than two decades.
- » The men's tennis team finished with an 18-9 record, led by Vladimir Paunic, who earned Academic All-American and Southland Conference Student-Athlete of the Year honors.



- » **Dr. Donnie Booth** and **Ms. Jean Urick** (Nursing) \$180,000 for "Funding for Tuition for RN to BSN Students" awarded by the Southwest Area Health Education Center HeaRTS Program to assist in the recruitment, training, and employment of RNs in Louisiana.
- » Ms. Rebecca Muller and Dr. Timothy Hudson (Mathematics) \$136,905 from the LA Board of Regents for "Enhancing Learning in Introductory Math Courses" to allow the expansion of the math computer lab beyond its pilot stage.
- » Dr. Camille Yates and Dr. Colleen Klein-Ezell (Teaching & Learning) \$112,788 for "Project C.U.D.L.E. Continuing Education 2007 - 2008



The Division of Continuing Education and Special Activities' main functions are the coordination of all non-credit and special activities, both on and off-campus, and the coordination of off-campus credit courses and telecourses. Continuing Education strives to meet the needs of the non-traditional student as well as the needs of business, industry, government, and the public sector. The division offers a variety of camps during the summer, and is also responsible for reserving Southeastern's facilities for off-campus groups.

Accomplishments of Continuing Education during the 2007-2008 academic year include:

Linus A. Sims Memorial Library: Sims Library utilizes a variety of technologies, including a 24/7 virtual reference service, to deliver resources and services to the students and faculty of Southeastern. The Library's online catalog, electronic indexes, full-text databases, and an electronic reserves system are made available on 130 computers throughout the building. Internet access, printing, and wireless technology are also offered. Many of the Library's operations are handled through the statewide automated library system, Sirsi UnicornLink, operated by the LOUIS office at Louisiana State University. Interlibrary Loan transactions are facilitated through use of ILLiad, an electronic Interlibrary Loan system, and through use of Ariel software designed to facilitate timely delivery of articles. The Library also subsidizes article delivery services for faculty and graduate students through Ingenta, a database which offers citations from 20,000 multi-disciplinary scholarly journals, in addition to electronic alerting and table of contents services. Within the Library, a computer lab, partially funded by the Student Technology Fee, provides access to a variety of application software packages. A computer with adaptive equipment and software, (including JAWS, Naturally Speaking, ZoomText, and OpenBook), is available in the Media Department. Two laboratory classrooms allow hands-on learning for students enrolled in the Library's credit course teaching information literacy skills and for course-specific bibliographic instruction classes. An additional classroom for non-credit instructional sessions utilizes a wireless laptop system to allow hands-on experience, and a presentation practice studio allows students to develop and rehearse multi-media presentations individually or in small groups. The Library's webpage provides links to the myriad of resources and services, with online forms available for a variety of service requests.

Center for Faculty Excellence: The Center for Faculty Excellence helps faculty assess and incorporate technology in their teaching through workshops, seminars, and individualized training. The Center offers software support ranging from basic office applications to graphics and video editing programs, as well as a variety of equipment including scanners, color printers, and digital cameras. The knowledge and skills faculty gain through the Center are transformed into tools and strategies that enhance both traditional and distance learning environments.



Space Utilization 2007 - 2008







State Appropriations per Full-Time Equivalent Student, SREB States, Fiscal Year 2006 - 2007







University Expenditures (Budgeted) by Function Fiscal Year 2008 - 2009







