

Longitudinal Enrollment

Southeastern's total student enrollment increased by 4.6% from the Fall 2001 semester to the Fall 2002 semester. This reflects a 4.4% increase in undergraduate enrollment and a 6.2% increase in graduate enrollment. Graduate enrollment includes students in Alternate Certification Programs.

Full-time Equivalent (FTE) Students Taught

The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students taught increased 5.9% from the Fall 2001 semester to the Fall 2002 semester. (Note: These FTE calculations are based on the undergraduate and graduate hours taught by departments. These calculations will differ from FTE calculations based on the student classification of undergraduate and graduate.) The number of full-time equivalent undergraduate students equals the total undergraduate student credit hour (SCH) production divided by 12, and the number of full-time equivalent graduate equals the total graduate SCH production divided by 9.

Average Course Loads

The average course load of undergraduate students is 13.5 hours which is a slight increase from 13.4 in Fall 2001. The average course load for graduate students (including Alternate Certification students, Master's plus 30, and Extended Studies students) is 6.1 hours, which is a slight decrease from 6.2 in Fall 2001. In Fall, a full-time undergraduate student is enrolled in 12 or more hours and full-time graduate students in 9 or more hours. Part-time undergraduate students are enrolled in less than 12 hours and graduate students in less than 9 hours.



The number of female students enrolled at Southeastern increased by 4.0% from Fall 2001 to Fall 2002; male students increased 5.8%. There were a total of 9,749 female students enrolled and 5,446 male students enrolled.

On-Campus and Off-Campus Enrollment

On-Campus and Off-Campus is based on where a student is taking courses each semester. If a student is only taking courses on either the Hammond or Baton Rouge campus, they are classified as on-campus students. If a student is only taking courses at other sites, such as at the St. Tammany Center, then they are classified as off-campus. Also included in off-campus are those students who are taking only distance education courses, and do not need to be on the campus. In some cases students take courses both on-campus and off-campus.
