When asked what benefits they received from hands-on experience, respondents had the following to say:

- Being out in the field helped me find my true calling.
- My thesis required original research. It gave me many skills including project management, lab skills, planning, research and writing skills.
- Wonderful teaching experience as a TA and research/lab experience completing my thesis.
- It better prepared me for employment.

### **Graduate Professional Education**

One (12.5%) of the respondents is currently enrolled in another Masters degree program, one (12.5%) have taken classes but not enrolled in a degree program, and five our (62.5%) have no plans for further education. Of those with plans for further education, one (50.0%) plans on obtaining a doctorate and one (50.0%) a second Masters degree. Both the respondents with graduate experience felt that Southeastern "Very Effectively" prepared them for further graduate/professional study and they were prepared "Better than Most" other students.

# **Employment**

Two (25.0%) of the respondents have not been employed full-time since graduating from Southeastern, while five (62.5%) have been employed full-time. Of those who have been employed full-time, one (20.0%) had a job before graduating, three (60.0%) took 1-6 months to find a job, and one (20.0%) took 7-12 months.

The four respondents who did not have a job upon graduation faced a variety of problems in obtaining employment. Table 2 presents what were considered major problems, minor problems, or no problem.

Three (60.0%) of those who have been employed full-time indicated their education was "Very Effective" in preparing them for employment or improving their job performance, one (20.0%) indicated it was "Effective", and one (20.0%) indicated it was "Ineffective". In regards to sources for learning about their first full-time job, one (20.0%) indicated a parent or relative, one (25.0%) from another student/friend, and two (40.0%) from an employment agency.

Five (62.5%) are currently employed full-time, one (12.5%) is unemployed but looking for employment, and one (12.5%) is unemployed and not looking for employment. Of those who are currently employed full-time, two (40.0%) are employed in the state of Louisiana. One (20.0%) is employed in industry, one (20.0%) in a professional firm, one (20.0%) in industry, one (20.0%) in government, and one (20.0%) is self-employed. When asked "If underemployment is defined as a condition in which your job requires lower levels of skill and training than those you acquired in college would you say that you are currently underemployed", one (20.0%) of the respondents indicated they are underemployed. Three (60.0%) of the respondents are well satisfied with their employment and would not consider leaving, and two (40.0%) are satisfied with their employment but would consider other employment. Four (80.0%) of the respondents are employed in an the area of their Southeastern major or a related area. One (20.0%) respondent indicated a salary range of \$20,001-\$25,000, two (40.0%) \$30,001-\$40,000, and two (40.0%) indicated a salary over \$50,000.

## **Professional Activities**

One (12.5%) of the respondents indicated they currently hold a license, and five (62.5%) indicated it is not available in their field. Currently held licenses include:

## Basic Catechist Certification

The one without licensure, does not plan on obtaining it within the next twelve months. Three (37.5%) of the respondents are members of a professional organization, and three (37.5%) have attended a professional meeting in the past year.

#### Comments

This section contains the opinions of all alumni who volunteered narrative comments in response to an open-ended question. Positive and negative comments which have specifically named faculty or staff have not been deleted. These comments should not be considered representative, but should be evaluated within the context of the other results. The only editing of the comments is the deletion of expletives. For some programs, there were no alumni comments.

Not all comments are distributed with every report. The Provost's report contains all comments for all programs in all colleges. The reports distributed to Deans contain only the comments for the departments which report to each Dean. Finally, each department is provided with the comments made only by their students in each program within the department. Any other distribution will not contain the comments.
