When asked what benefits they received from hands-on experience, respondents had the following to say:

- Trained me to be a better writer. I use that skill everyday in my profession.
- I gained professional experience that taught me managerial and administrative duties and concepts.
- I had three internships while at Southeastern. I received real world experience and networking from the internship and much appreciated encouragement from the Southeastern History department faculty.
- I was able to apply my organizational skills and learn what went into museum work.

### **Graduate Professional Education**

Two (16.7%) of the respondents is currently enrolled in a degree program, one (8.3%) has completed a second Masters degree, two (16.7%) plan to enroll in the future, and five (41.7%) have no plans for further education. Of those with plans for further education, three (60.0%) plan on obtaining a doctorate. Of those with further educational experience, one (33.3%) felt that Southeastern "Very Effectively" prepared them for further graduate/professional study and two (66.7%) felt Southeastern prepared them "Effectively". Furthermore, one felt they were prepared "Better than Most" other students and two (66.7%) felt they were prepared "About the Same as Most" other students. One respondent (33.3%) is in a degree program "Very Closely Related" to her/his Master's degree from Southeastern and two (66.7%) are in a program "Not at all Related".

### **Employment**

Ten (83.3%) of the respondents have been employed full-time since graduating from Southeastern. Three (30.0%) had a job before graduating, five (50.0%) took 1-6 months to find a job, and two (20.0%) took 7-12 months.

The seven respondents who did not have a job upon graduation faced a variety of problems in obtaining employment. Table 2 presents what were considered major problems, minor problems, or no problem.

Six (60.0%) of those who have been employed full-time indicated their education was "Very Effective" in preparing them for employment or improving their job performance, three (30.0%) indicated it was "Effective", and one (10.0%) indicated it was "Very Ineffective". In regards to sources for learning about their first full-time job, one (10.0%) indicated a parent or relative, one (10.0%) from a professional organization, three (30.0%) from another student/friend, four (40.0%) already had the job, and one (10.0%) from an employment agency.

Nine (75.0%) are currently employed full-time and one (8.3%) is unemployed but looking for employment. Of those who are currently employed full-time, seven (77.8%) are employed in the state of Louisiana. Three (33.3%) are employed in business, one (11.1%) in higher education, one (11.1%) in government, and four (44.4%) in K-12. When asked "If underemployment is defined as a condition in which your job requires lower levels of skill and training than those you acquired in college would you say that you are currently underemployed", four (44.4%) of the respondents indicated they are underemployed. Three (33.3%) of the respondents are well satisfied with their employment and would not consider leaving and six (66.7%) are satisfied with their employment but would consider other employment. Four (44.4%) of the respondents are employed in an the area of their Southeastern major or a related area. One (11.1%) respondent indicated a salary range of \$25,001-\$30,000, two (22.2%) \$30,001-\$40,000, two (22.2%) \$40,001-\$50,000 and four (44.4%) indicated a salary over \$50,000.

### **Professional Activities**

Three (25.0%) of the respondents indicated they currently hold a license, and two (16.7%) indicated it is not available in their field. Currently held licenses include:

- Teacher Certification (2)
- Food Safe Certificate

Of the five without licensure, one (20.0%) plan on obtaining a teaching certificate within the next twelve months. Two (16.7%) of the respondents are members of a professional organization, and four (33.3%) have attended a professional meeting in the past year.

### Comments

This section contains the opinions of all alumni who volunteered narrative comments in response to an open-ended question. Positive and negative comments which have specifically named faculty or staff have not been deleted. These comments should not be considered representative, but should be evaluated within the context of the other results. The only editing of the comments is the deletion of expletives. For some programs, there were no alumni comments.

Not all comments are distributed with every report. The Provost's report contains all comments for all programs in all colleges. The reports distributed to Deans contain only the comments for the departments which report to each Dean. Finally, each department is provided with the comments made only by their students in each program within the department. Any other distribution will not contain the comments.
