DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATION

The mission of the Department of Communication is manifold and varied:

- To offer students a liberal education in and a basic understanding of historical and contemporary aspects of 1. Western culture through the study of communication in that culture.
- To expose students to concepts, theories, and research methods related to the broad field of communication. 2.
- 3. To train students in certain skills and to furnish them with knowledge of the communication processes so as to enable them to function more effectively in society.
- 4. To prepare students for further work in the field by offering at least basic courses in the various areas of the discipline.
- 5. To afford students the basic knowledge required to become teachers in the fields of speech and journalism at the high school level.
- 6. To serve the University and community by providing knowledge and expertise in speech, journalism, and mass communication.

The Department of Communication teaches speech fundamentals; critical thinking; research skills; writing, producing and directing for print, broadcast and online media; mass communication and journalism; interpersonal and intrapersonal communication; forensics; communication theory; organizational communication; speech education; and journalism education.

ENROLLMENT IN COMMUNICATION COURSES

All students are permitted to enroll in any communication course a maximum of two times; this includes course withdrawals (W grades). The only exceptions are Communication 210 or 211 or with the consent of department head.

MAJOR

Students wishing to major in Communication must complete 39 semester hours of Communication courses. Students must complete the 21 hour core requirement, and 18 hours of prescribed courses in one of the concentrations. The major in Communication leads to the degree of Bachelor of Arts.
