## DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

The Department of English at Southeastern Louisiana University fosters students' abilities to think analytically and creatively, write clearly and cogently, and integrate critical judgment with imagination in reading texts. The Department's tradition of concern for the individual student sustains a strong sense of intellectual community, diversity and vitality. To round out its commitment to education that is both engaged with the world and personally rewarding, the Department sponsors cultural events, serves external communities, and promotes global awareness. English faculty teach courses in basic composition and literature supporting the University's general education core, and undergraduate and graduate courses in literary studies, composition, creative writing, professional writing, pedagogy, and linguistics. All curricula are designed to provide humanistic education that prepares students for graduate study and develops their practical skills for every profession, including education, law, professional writing, and the arts. In addition, the Department offers a major in Liberal Arts Studies designed to provide the student with a background in the humanities. For graduation the Department requires a minimum of 120 semester hours properly distributed among the various disciplines of the University.

Candidates for the bachelor's degree in English must earn, at Southeastern, a minimum of eighteen semester hours required in the major field.

## Placement in English

Placement of entering freshmen in English courses is based on the English score and the Composite score on the American College Test. (See American College Test in this catalogue.) Students are not permitted to register for English until these scores are on file in the Office of Testing.

The American College Test is not used as an entrance examination. Rather, it is used as a means of determining the degree of preparation in English. The placement procedure, outlined below, ensures (1) that each entering freshman will begin his/her study of English at the highest level for which he/she is prepared at the time he/she enters Southeastern, and (2) that each one who is assigned placement in English will automatically receive credit for the prerequisite course or courses.

1. A student whose ACT English score indicates the need for a review of basic sentence structure and functional grammar will be required to pass Transitional English 92 before entering English 101.
2. A student whose ACT English score indicates adequate usage of functional grammar and sentence structure will be placed in English 101.
3. A student with the eligibility criterion of a composite Enhanced ACT score of 21 or higher who desires to enter the Honors Program must enroll in English 121H for his/her first English course.
4. A student whose ACT English score indicates above-average preparation in English usage will be placed in either English 102 or English 122 (Honors), depending on the level of his/her preparation. Upon successful completion of English 102 or 122H, the student will receive the Grade " $P$," with 3 credit hours, for English 101.
5. A student whose ACT English and composite scores indicate that he/she does not need freshman composition will be given a writing test. If his/her writing also indicates that he/she does not need freshman composition, he/she will be placed in sophomore literature. Upon successful completion of English 230, 231, 232, 291H, $292 \mathrm{H}, 301,303$ or 351, the student will receive the grade of "P," with 3 credit hours each, for English 101 and 102.
6. Placement of beginning freshmen according to ACT scores:

English 92: ACT English score of 17 or below. Credit does not count toward graduation.
English 101: ACT English score of 18 or higher.
English 102: ACT English score of 29 or higher. Credit for English 101 with grade "P" upon successful completion of English 102.
English 122 H (Honors): ACT English score of 32 or higher. Credit for English 101 with grade "P" upon successful completion of English 122H. Credit for English 122H in lieu of English 102.
Sophomore English: A minimum combined ACT English and Composite score of 65 AND an advancedstanding examination (a composition administered and evaluated by the Department of English). Credit for English 101 and 102 with grade" P" upon successful completion of English 230, 231, 232, 291H, 292H, 301, 303, or 351.

## Curriculum in Liberal Arts Studies

Students who are interested in a general Liberal Arts education and are not interested in specializing in a particular field of study should enroll in the Curriculum in Liberal Arts Studies. The major requirements will be considered filled upon the completion of 27 semester hours in English and 24 semester hours in one of these subjects: communications, criminal justice, dance-performing arts, a foreign language, political science, history, mass communication and journalism, music, philosophy, psychology, sociology, social work, theatre, visual arts. A student may not claim a minor in English or the second humanities field.

Members of the Department of English will advise students who pursue this curriculum. A grade point average of 2.0 is required in each of the two major subjects, averaged separately.
